Ms Miles, 30, a freelance producer, will leave Long Beach, California, in April with the crew's founding members and Edinburgh RAF officer Ms Todd, 31.

Ella Hewton, 23, a marketing executive from Taunton, has been chosen as the first reserve for the journey to Cairns, Queensland.

The recruits are inexperienced rowers but should be in good hands with Londoners Ms Hancock, 27, and Ms Penhaul, 30. The dynamic duo recently paddle-boarded for 1,000 miles down America's Missouri River, as a 'warmup' for the ocean row.

The team, who are being trained by Team GB coach Alex Wolf, need £100,000 to pay for the trip and are fundraising via their website.
